Stephanie is an Outreach Librarian for the Minnesota State Law Library providing Law Library Service to Prisoners (LLSP). If you ask her what she does in this role, she will tell you to read the article she recently wrote about her job that appears in the October issue of *Computers In Libraries* ([www.infotoday.com](http://www.infotoday.com)) or, as she did with me, she will gladly tell you what her job is all about.

First, there are no typical days in Stephanie's work life. "Everyday is different... and, very interesting!" In brief, Stephanie visits inmates at the above mentioned facilities to interview and direct the inmates to the information appropriate to their particular situation. This may include issues surrounding a paternity suit, information needed for an appeal, agency addresses, DNA testing issues, or Department of Corrections policies.

Metro State and Washington County Library (where she still works part-time) and she received her Masters Degree in Library Science from the College of St. Catherine. Her undergraduate degree is from the University of Wisconsin, which she attended at the same time her two children were attending college – one at Macalester and the other at Evergreen in Washington State. ## Ethics and Professional Responsibility Update

All the attorneys around us need to be up-to-date on matters concerning ethics and professional responsibility, whether they are practicing in law firms, the public sector, or teaching law. The web has much to offer.

Of course, one of the first places to head is the ABA Center for Professional Responsibility (<http://www.abanet.org/cpr/home.html>). But as is typical for the ABA, much is touted but little is given away for free. Many links simply generate an order form for purchasing a printed publication. We fare better in the field of ethics than in other areas, however. We can view the ABA Model Rules of Professional Conduct at [http://www.abanet.org/cpr/mrpc/mrpc\\_toc.html](http://www.abanet.org/cpr/mrpc/mrpc_toc.html), including recent changes, comments, and Model Code comparisons. We can get "Head note" summaries of formal opinions of the ABA's Standing Committee on Ethics and Professional Responsibility at <http://www.abanet.org/cpr/ethicopinions.html>. The full opinions are available for purchase in the publications section of the ABA site.

The premier portal for ethics-

related materials on the web remains the American Legal Ethics Library, provided by Cornell at <http://www.law.cornell.edu/ethics/index.html>. We can search by jurisdiction and link to rules of conduct, disciplinary rules, and opinions.

Two other portal sites for ethics and professional responsibility are Findlaw (<http://www.findlaw.com/01topics/14ethics/index.html>) and LegalEthics.com (<http://www.legalethics.com/>). Both offer news, articles, discussion groups, and links to relevant web sites.

### Discussions/Commentaries/Annotations

It isn't often that we can get annotated law on the web (or anywhere) for free, but Cornell offers its American Ethics Library narratives (<http://www.law.cornell.edu/ethics/index.html>) for 17 states at the time of this writing. Minnesota is not one of the 17 states, but Texas is. Interestingly, the narrative is supplied by Vinson & Elkins, counsel for Enron.

The American College of Trust and Estate Counsel (ACTEC) offers commentaries on the Model Rules of Professional Conduct at <http://www.actec.org/pubInfoArk/comm/toc.html>.

Three web sites present articles on particular areas of ethics and professional responsibility law. Charles F. Luce, Jr., a member of the Colorado Bar Association's Legal Ethics Committee, offers his "On Legal Ethics and the Practice of Law" at <http://www.mgovg.com/ethics/>. We can find about 15 articles on ethics, such as "Who Owns the Client File?" Many of the articles are over three years old, and there is no indication they have been updated.

Freivogel on Conflicts (<http://www.freivogelonconflicts.com>) includes a collection of conflicts cases and authorities, divided into categories, by the former Loss Prevention Counsel of Attorneys' Liability Assurance Society (ALAS).

Washington and Lee University School of Law Professor Brad Wendel's "Legal Ethics Resources on the Web" (<http://home.wlu.edu/~wendelb/ethlinks.htm>) includes short, useful descriptions of a number of sources of guidance on legal ethics.

### Multidisciplinary Practice

The issues of multi-disciplinary practice for attorneys and of the relationship/conflicts between accountants' professional standards and lawyers' professional standards are getting much press

lately, thanks in part to the Enron implosion and changes in the way lawyers are allowed to do business.

Of much current interest are “New York’s Rules For Cooperative Business Arrangements Between Lawyers and Nonlegal Professionals” at <http://www.nysba.org/opinions/mdprules.html>. New York was the first state to adopt rules for the multidisciplinary practice of law (effective November 2001), and other states—including Minnesota—may follow. The full-text committee report of the New York State Bar Association that advocated adoption of the rules is at <http://www.law.cornell.edu/ethics/mdp.htm>.

Also of interest is the Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants, put out by the International Federation of Accountants. The code is available for download at <http://www.ifac.org/Store/Details.tmp?SID=9560085866929&Category=Ethics&Title=Code%20of%20>

## What’s New in Minnesota

Our first stop, of course, is still the Minnesota Lawyers Professional Responsibility Board Home Page (<http://www.courts.state.mn.us/lprb>). It’s the gateway to the LPRB’s Internet resources, linking us to the Minnesota Rules of Professional Conduct (<http://www.courts.state.mn.us/lprb/conduct.html>), Minnesota Rules on Lawyers Professional Responsibility (<http://www.courts.state.mn.us/lprb/rules.html>), and to opinions of the Lawyers Professional Responsibility Board (<http://www.courts.state.mn.us/lprb/opinions.html>) (selective, since 1996). It also provides the List of Disbarred and Currently Suspended Lawyers (<http://www.courts.state.mn.us/lprb/dbintro.html>), an index to *Bench & Bar*

articles concerning Minnesota professional responsibility issues (<http://www.courts.state.mn.us/lprb/benchbar.html>), as well as links to full-text articles from *Finance & Commerce Minnesota Lawyer*, dating back to October 1997 (<http://www.courts.state.mn.us/lprb/fcindex.html>).

Your attorneys may inquire about the new “Professional Aspirations” that were passed by the Minnesota Supreme Court in 2001. Those aspirations are online at <http://www.courts.state.mn.us/lprb/profasp.html>, and there’s a thought-provoking article about them at <http://www2.mnbar.org/benchandbar/2001/apr01/essay.htm>. The article is written by Bill Wernz, Ethics Partner and a member of the trial department at Dorsey & Whitney. From 1985 to 1992, Bill also served as the Director of the Lawyers Professional Responsibility Board. Not too many articles contain footnotes to Aristotle, Thomas Aquinas, and William Mitchell College of Law Dean Harry Haynsworth. §
