### PART I = Digitized Historical Collections

#### [MoML VI: Foreign, Comparative, and International Law, c. 1620-1926 \(Releasing JUN 2012\)](#)

**Foreign Law** Foreign law covers the national and sub-national (e.g., provincial) laws or other jurisdictions. Although “foreign law” often refers to the law of any jurisdiction other than the United States, it also has a narrower connotation; some law librarians restrict the term foreign law to jurisdictions outside of the Anglo-American legal family.

**Comparative Law** From the FCIL Librarian’s perspective, comparative law plays out as a foreign law question. Scholars do not agree on how many types of legal systems exist in the world, but the major types are common law, civil law, Islamic, and mixed (a combination of one or more legal systems). Other types are the Talmudic, customary, indigenous, and socialist legal systems.

**International Law** Classical public international law deals exclusively with the legal system governing relations between nations, such as maritime law. Modern concepts extend to international organizations, nations, and individuals. Human rights, international trade, and the environment are among new subjects in public international law.

## Topic Areas (a finalized title list under development)

**International and Comparative Law.** A collection of international law titles in English and major western European languages. Primarily a monograph collection corresponding to the period of *MoML Legal Treatises*, with “classics” such as Grotius and early modern writers.

**Classics of European Law.** Encompasses foreign legal treatises. The term "treatise" is more of a common-law category and the equivalent works in civil-law systems may have other names such as commentaries, encyclopedias, textbooks, monographs, or festschriften. Languages would include French, German, Spanish, Portuguese, Latin, Dutch, Italian, and other Western languages, with English language titles favored.

**Roman and Canon Law.** Complements treatises included in *MoML: Legal Treatises*. Recognizes that the roots of English common law will be found in the deep recesses of European history.

### [Making of Modern Law: Primary Sources I, 1620-1926 \(MoML IV\)](#)

... is a fully searchable digital archive of approximately 3,500 individual titles. Of interest to law libraries and historians of American history, and designed to complement *Making of Modern Law: US & UK Legal Treatises, 1800-1926*, it is a virtual gold mine of information for legal historians.

*Primary Sources, Part I* contains constitutional conventions and compilations (reports, journals, proceedings, and debates, and supplementary documents published by the conventions including, manuals, rules of order, and information for the use of delegates); city charters (the texts of enacted and proposed charters and ordinances in American jurisdictions); law dictionaries (a surprisingly important research tool); and early U.S. state codes; among other categories that are not available in digital form from competing services. *Primary Sources, Part I* also includes colonial records from *Published Records of the American Colonies*.

### [MoML V: Primary Sources II, 1763-1970](#)

... is a fully searchable digital archive of approximately 1.6 million pages, thematically a continuation of our primary sources content, and an enhanced completeness of historical code and other primary source content - sourced from Harvard and Yale Law Libraries, and from the Law Library of Congress.

Again, Gale applies the term primary sources not in the historian’s sense of a manuscript, letter, or diary, but rather in the legal sense of a case, statute, or regulation. Our goal is to create the most authoritative collection of online state codes. This includes public domain codes for period 1925-1970 as expanding the date range beyond 1926 gives this collection added value. Also included will be runs of historical US Federal Codes. *Primary Sources, Part II* will further include a large number of US Municipal Codes and City Charters which were not included in *Primary Sources, Part I*.

**Is there an annual maintenance fee once they are purchased?**

Yes, there is an annual hosting fee. This fee ranges from \$50 a year to \$1200 a year depending on the size of the institution and number of titles it has purchased to date. In addition, this hosting fee is capped (again dependent on size and past purchase history). Your institution may already be capped or have a significant base toward the cap through the main campus purchase history.

**What will you do if relevant titles are added to the law collection in coming years?**

When a new title is added to the platform each account can make a decision to buy the new edition/release. Our model is a purchase model - buy it you own it and access is 24/7.

**What is the e-book platform? Does it allow for multiple simultaneous users or is it a one book, one user model?**
