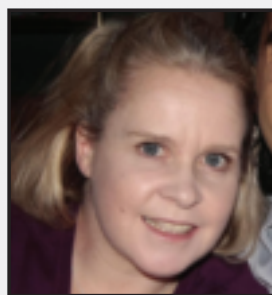
*"Was that a Legal Hit? Where the worlds of cross-references and cross-checks collide..."*
