The Awards Committee is pleased to announce that **Shelley L. Dowling** and **Mary L. Custy** are the recipients of the 2001 Joseph L. Andrews

Bibliographical Award for their work, *The Jurisprudence of United States Constitutional Interpretation: An Annotated Bibliography* (Fred Rothman & Co., 1999).

The Joseph L. Andrews Bibliographical Award honors significant contributions to legal bibliographic literature. Each nominated work is measured primarily by its creative and evaluative elements and the extent to which judgment was a factor in the formation of the work. The Association's oldest award, it was established in 1967 to honor Joseph L. Andrews, a reference librarian at the Association of the Bar of the City of New York. The 2001 Andrews Award Subcommittee members included Carol

Grant, John Hasko, Carole Hinchcliff and Chair Marie-Louise Bernal.

The Jurisprudence of United States Constitutional Interpretation "attempts to capture the entire spectrum of published and electronic resources embodying the jurisprudence of U.S. constitutional interpretation." Listings are categorized by type of source — primary, secondary, miscellaneous, electronic and Supreme Court resources — and include complete bibliographic information. Annotations include citations to book reviews where applicable. Appendices provide listings by author, title, periodical title and a separate subject index. This excellent work includes a foreword contributed by Sandra Day O'Connor, associate justice of the Supreme Court of the United States.

About the Authors

Shelley L. Dowling holds a B.A. from Mt. Saint Scholastica College, an M.L.S. from Rutgers University and a J.D. from the

University of Missouri-Kansas City. She has been a librarian at public libraries in Pasadena, Calif., and Kansas City, Mo., and head of public services at both the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Law and Georgetown University Law Center. Dowling is currently librarian of the court at the Supreme Court of the United States Library, a position she has held since 1989.
